Update from Presiding Judge Jacobs

As we are approaching the one-year anniversary of COVID-19 seriously impacting the 13th Circuit, I wanted to take this opportunity to update everyone on our collective successes. Since last March, the Circuit and its attorneys have worked together to stay on top of, and ahead of, the issues caused by COVID-19. In addition to ensuring compliance with local, state and Supreme Court requirements, we also made efforts to ensure cases were still moving. Here are some statistics based on those efforts:

1. The 13th Circuit has held jury trials in both Boone and Callaway counties. Boone County was specifically named by the Supreme Court Chief Justice in his State of the Judiciary as one of at least 11 counties that held a jury trial. Upon entering the courthouses, jurors were given temperature checks and asked COVID questions, were required to wear masks or shields during voir dire and the trial and were required to maintain social distance. The Court has not been contacted regarding transmission of COVID as a result of a jury trial. Boone has had 6 jury trials; Callaway has had one; both counties have held grand juries.

- 2. At the national level, there is news of a backlog of cases due to COVID. The 13th Circuit's case disposition rate improved from calendar 2019 to calendar 2020. Specifically, the Circuit's disposition rate in 2019 was 92.2%, in 2020, it was 98.9%. When isolating disposition rates for criminal cases in the 13th Circuit, in 2019 the disposition rate was 83.54%, in 2020 it was 101.55%. Comparing numbers, the Court disposed of 7,614 cases in 2019, and 7,980 cases in 2020. We are particularly proud of this statistic. By not being backlogged, judges are able to promptly schedule trials and hearings.
- 3. The Court has operated pursuant to the Supreme Court Operational Directives and has been able to continue hearing cases at least by video since the pandemic started. Some staff have already been vaccinated, as they fell under 1B, Tiers 1 and 2, and we are coordinating with local and statewide vaccination efforts for everyone else who falls under Tier 3.
- 4. The 13th Circuit was able to obtain more than 8,000 masks through CARES funding for the public and staff, and juveniles at the detention center. The Circuit was also able to obtain video technology to allow dockets to be both in person and via video.

Transition to Webex

Since enabling video court, the Circuit has been sending invitations to attorneys and parties with links to Zoom. Effective April 1, 2021, the Supreme Court is no longer allowing courts to utilize Zoom. Therefore, most divisions of the 13th Circuit will be utilizing Webex. In lieu of sending invitations to attorneys and parties, those individuals may attend court by video or phone by utilizing the links to the Webex division's rooms available on the Court's website.

Future of Video

As we continue to utilize video, the 13th Circuit has developed a technology committee to assist with recommending policies and procedures regarding remote hearings. It is anticipated that as long as COVID is a factor, video will be utilized for court. This committee, which will be chaired by **Judge Harris**, will participate in discussions about what court might look like post-COVID, with an eye toward allowing remote proceedings in many circumstances.

On a personal note, I want to thank all the attorneys and court staff in this Circuit for their work and flexibility this past year. Faced with circumstances beyond our control, we have shown we can still triumph through the strength of our unity and concern for one another.

Sheriff Carey CLE Approved for 1 Hour of Credit

Last month's CLE presentation by Sheriff Carey had 55 participants and was approved for 1.0 hours of CLE credit by the Missouri Bar.

Important Updates from the Court

Webex

As mentioned by **Judge Jacobs** above, following a Supreme Court mandate, the 13th Circuit must use Webex, and only Webex, by April 1, 2021. Most divisions began using Webex exclusively by March 1. The Court will discontinue sending out links by division. Instead, attorneys and parties may go to the Court's website and join by selecting the appropriate division's account. Also, please note that a virtual background has, at times, made Webex not work as efficiently.

Boone and Callaway County Courthouses Transition to Operating Directive Phase 2 As of Monday, February 22 at 8 a.m., the Boone and Callaway County Courthouses moved to Supreme Court Operating Directive Phase 2. Pursuant to the Supreme Court requirements, face masks or coverings will continue to be required in all public court areas and during all court proceedings, unless good cause is shown to limit the requirement in particular proceedings. The Court has face shields available for witnesses and parties if needed. There are masks available for anyone who needs them.

The Court will continue utilizing available technology to limit in-person courtroom appearances to the extent practicable. The Circuit has been in Phase 1 since October 25, 2020.

New Local Court Rule

At the February 23rd Court en Banc meeting, the Court discussed motions to continue sometimes being filed as late as the night before a court proceeding is scheduled to occur. When the Court has scheduled an interpreter, or interpreters, to appear in person for a case and the case is continued last minute, the Court must still pay for the full cost of the interpreter(s). Based on section 476.806, RSMo, and reviewing other courts' policies, the 13th Circuit adopted a new local rule that will become effective April 26, 2021. Please note the rule only applies to civil cases and gives the Court discretion whether to tax the cost to a party or parties. Below is the new rule:

56.2 INTERPRETER FEE

In a civil case where at least one interpreter is scheduled by the Court to appear, the Court may tax the cost of an interpreter (or interpreters) to a party if a party or his or her attorney files a motion to continue less than 48 hours prior to the Court proceeding.



Judge Harris Authors Article

Judge Jeff Harris authored an article entitled "Observations on the 2020 COVID-19 Pandemic from a Circuit Judge in Central Missouri, U.S.A." in the recently published book *Legal Responses to COVID-19 Around the World*. The book includes articles by jurists and lawyers from fifty countries who describe their experiences during the initial phases of the pandemic and the effects of the pandemic on legal systems worldwide.
